**Old Fashioned
Strawberry Shortcake**

Make your favorite sweet biscuit recipe. While they are cooling down, wash & slice a basket of strawberries. Sprinkle with sugar to your taste and let marinate for an hour or so to

bring out the juices. Whip up 1/2 pint of whipping cream to soft peaks, adding sugar and small amount of vanilla to taste. Slice biscuits in half, place one half on a plate, mound strawberries on top, with a spoonful of juices, top with a big dollop of whipped cream, then angle the other half of the biscuit on top. 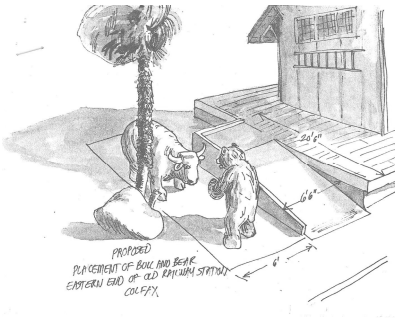

2009 GRACE HUBLEY AWARD

Steve Coverston has received the 2009 Grace Hubley Award, an art commission. He'll be present on April 10 at the Colfax Area Heritage Museum for the local unveiling of his *graphite au aire* drawing titled Sunset Terrace, an illustration of the historic 1880's Hubley House located on Ben Taylor Road.

The drawing will be on exhibit at the museum following the event.

In 2002, Steve Coverston received the Governor's Historic Preservation Award at the State Capitol from Governor Davis in recognition of the Colfax calendars he and his students have created over the years. He is

currently Head of the Fine Art Department at Colfax High School.

Helen Wayland, Museum Director, says "Steve Coverston is the exceptional teacher who touches lives, opens the world to students and their family. He is one you remember, one who gives beyond the class room and one who put Colfax on the map, when the class received the governor's award for historic preservation."

A primary goal of the Grace Hubley Foundation is to commission or acquire artwork from local area artists for the purpose

of celebrating and helping ensure these works are available for appreciation by the general public.

The Grace Hubley Foundation is a nonprofit organization named for a Colfax local of the late 19th and early 20th century. Born in Pennsylvania in 1877, Hubley moved to Colfax with her family as a young child. As a young adult in San Francisco, she became a professional listed as "one of the best women photographers in the West" by Camera Craft Magazine. Over 8,500 of her glass negatives currently reside in the Colfax Area Historical Society's Archives. The 1880's Hubley House was part of a larger homestead and orchard built by her grandfather and run

by her father who was pre-dominant in the Colfax

Fruit Growers Association.

The Foundation works closely with the Colfax Area Historical Society. The Society efforts have been responsible for both preserving the Hubley negatives as well as recently saving the Hubley House from potential demolition.

CLARA BARTON OF THE RED CROSS

Did you miss the Rummage on the 2-3 of April? The women of the Methodist Church hold a very interesting sale. Always something you just got to have! This time I found a booklet. I was just straightening the books, not looking for anything to buy, and there it was! I spotted a Scholastic Booklet that sold originally for 85 cents in 1974, with the title "Clara Barton". This time it was selling for 25 cents. It was a paperback. Here is **why** I bought it:

My father was born in **November 1885**. His father, **John Herbert Bickford** ran sheep in the High Sierras around what is called White Rock Lake, above Webber Lake. He and my grandmother had a cabin at White Rock Lake. They worked with Mr. Mills in the sheep business. It was a log cabin and it lasted a

long time. I have a photo of most of the logs fallen with my Father, my brother, and my son Patrick standing near the ruins in 1948. To get to the story. In the summer of **1886, Clara Barton** made a trip to California. At that time the road went past Webber Lake....not where it is now over by Donner Lake. **Clara Barton** arrived in the area, and being from the same part of the USA that my grandmother had come from....**Clara** visited my Grandmother, **Franciner Reed Bickford**, in her log cabin at White Rock Lake. My father was around 8-9 months old, and needed to be rocked as he was not walking. Clara rocked my father that day, while visiting with my grandmother. That is reason I bought the booklet at the Rummage Sale on April 3rd this year.

I could add more infor-

mation about my grandparents spending the summer at White Rock Lake. When they arrived there, no fish were swimming in White Rock Lake, so my Grandfather, a real big tall man, had another man who was there help him carry a **wash tub** full of fish from Independence Lake up the hill between two horses and then dump them in White Rock Lake.

I have often wondered how they balanced that wash tub without losing the fish! That is some of the stories I have heard from my **father, J. Arthur Bickford** who was born and raised on the Bickford Ranch west of Penryn, My dad was a cattleman and continued to live there in the winters, and moved his cattle to the Summer Ranch on Hwy 89 during the Summers.

Alexander McLennan, 78, of Chicago Park died Tuesday of last week of self-inflicted gunshot wounds. Funeral services were held Thursday at 11 a.m. at the Colfax District Cemetery under the auspices of Colfax Post, American Legion. Quinn's Sierra Chapel handled the arrangements.

McLennan was a native of Australia, retired fruit rancher. He had been a resident of California for 55 years and a resident of Chicago Park for 17 years.

He is survived by a brother, William McLennan of Chicago Park, and a sister, Mrs. H. Atkins of Australia.

worth a try. I have been searching all the data bases I can find and come up with nothing so far. This is what we know. They lived in Colfax (or near surrounding area). Mother's name was Gine or Gene. Father was Neils or Niles or Niels Knudsen. Both born in Denmark 1864. We don't know how or when they arrived in America or California. Six children: Elsa May, Neils William, Christopher, Fredrick, Earnest, ad Delbert. Born between 1886 and 1898-99. On August 4, 1895 the father was killed in a railroad accident. In late 1898 or early 1899 the mother tried to burn house down with some or all of the children inside. Earnest and Delbert were sent to different orphanages and we don't know what happened to the other 4 children. Gine was sent to a "hospital" in Stockton for many years. Christopher died December 27, 1906 also from a railroad accident. Four are buried in old Colfax cemetery. Niles, Kris H., Earnest and Gine. Only Gine's grave is unaccounted for. The death certificate does say

she is buried there however. This is a sad mixed-up family for sure. My mother-in-law is 89 and I am trying to find out answers for her and verify what she was told. Any help or direction would be appreciated so much. Thank you for your time. Sincerely, Kriss
