

CIVIL WAR ARTIFACTS ON DISPLAY






We have a number Civil War artifacts currently on display at our museum. All of the artifacts have been loaned to us by Mike Maynard and were saved by Mike's late mother, Charlene Fontana.

The Civil War items all come from Mike's Great-great-grandfather on his mother's side, James E. West. James was a native of Machias, Maine and served in the Civil War.

James E. West was a member of the 6th Maine Regimental Band, having joined this group on July 5, 1861. The photo above is of the Regimental Band and was taken in 1862. In this photo James is the shorter member in the middle of the top row. An enlarged picture of James is on the right.



The cornet above, along with its original case, is part of this collection. It is the instrument that he is holding in the top two photographs. Below is James' Soldiers Hand Book.



Other significant items in this collection are his diary and his discharge certificate. There is also a

second photo of the band standing in a farmer's field.

James E. West moved to Idaho in 1865, and from there to California. He resided in the Santa Cruz Mountains and ran a livery stable in Soquel. His son, George E. West was schooled in Soquel.

Between 1885 and and 1903 George worked in Monterey County, San Francisco, and Honolulu.

George arrived in Colfax on October 3, 1903. Here he married Frances Clique, a native of New Jersey. They had one son, Francis E. West, Mike's gandfather and Charlene (West) Fontana's father.

In addition to these items on loan, Mike Maynard has donated a large number of items from his mother's collection to the museum.

Strawberry Mousse

1 quart whipping cream

1 box ripe strawberries

1 cup sugar

11/4 tbsp. unflavored gelatin

2 tbsp. cold water

3 tbsp. boiling water

sugar and let stand for 1 hour. In a small bowl sprinkle cold water over gelatin and set aside. After berries set, mash and strain to remove seeds. Dissolve bloomed gelatin in boiling water and add it to the berry and sugar mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Whip cream to soft peaks, fold in berry mixture, pack in mold and freeze until hard.

HERITAGE TRAIL

The 6^{th} Annual Heritage Trail will be held on August 10-11, 2013. Nineteen participating museums from Roseville to Tahoe will showcase history in a fun and entertaining way. Admission is free to all visitors.

Placer County, California, which crosses the majestic Sierra Nevada was home to a thriving Native American culture, the California Gold Rush, the construction of the Transcontinental Railroad, and an agricultural paradise, which shipped high quality fruit around the world.

The museums, mostly located (within 5 miles) of Interstate 80, between Roseville and North Lake Tahoe, are open from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on both days.

Activities at each museum are varied. For example, visitors to the Placer County Museum in Auburn may meet Alma Bell, who was incarcerated in the dingy outdoor granite quarters under the courthouse stairs; watch a blacksmith in action at the Forest Hill Divide Museum; or listen to Native American stories at the Maidu Museum in Roseville. Hands on activities include gold panning, biscuit making, and 19th century games.

Trail Guides will be available at every museum in July. For complete information visit theheritagetrail.blogspot.com or call 1-530-889-6500.

Museums located in South Placer are the Lincoln Area Archives Museum, Maidu Museum & Historic Site (Roseville), Roseville Historical Society Carnegie Museum, Roseville

Telephone Museum, Rocklin History Museum, and the Griffith Quarry Museum (Penryn).

The museums in and around Auburn, all within one mile of the Historic Courthouse, include the Benton Welty School Room, Bernhard Museum Complex, Gold Country Museum, Placer County Museum, Joss House Museum, and the Gold Country Medical History Museum.

The mountain museums located in the Sierra Nevada and Lake Tahoe areas are the Forest Hill Divide Museum, Colfax Area Heritage Museum, Golden Drift Museum (Dutch Flat), Donner Summit Historical Society Museum (Soda Springs), Western SkiSport Museum (Boreal), Gatekeeper's Museum (Tahoe City), and the Watson Cabin (Tahoe City).

Her father had been a clown for the Ringling Bros., Barnum and Bailey Circus and she was born in a circus wagon in Hoquiam, WA. She took the sobriquet Mumzie after a group of English children took to her act and referred to their "mums."

The CAHS Spring Meeting will be held at the Depot on Saturday, May 25th at 7:00 pm. Our guest speaker will be Ken Yeo from the Nevada County

Narrow Gauge (NCNG) Railroad Museum. Ken has a lot of knowledge and pictures to share with us.

The NCNG, which operated between Nevada County and Colfax, was operational between 1850 and 1943. It was affectionately, if humorously, called the "Never Come, Never Go." The NCNG hauled both passengers and freight between Grass Valley/Nevada City and Colfax and was critical to fruit orchards between these two terminuses and the packing houses in Colfax.

When the service was shut down, the tracks were contributed to the WWII war effort.

EARLY TOURIST GUIDES

There were a number of tourist guides was at Colfax, thirty five miles* east of saw hundreds sitting on the ground, written during the construction of the Transcontinental Railroad. The Central Pacific welcomed these publications and often provided material to the writers. The following is from a tourist guide article written in 1867 by Albert Richardson, a newspaper reporter for the New York Tribune.

"The cars now (1867) run nearly to the summit of the Sierras. At the time of my visit (Sept. 1865) the terminus

Sacramento. Thence we took horses for twelve miles. Upon this little section of road four thousand laborers were at work — one tenth Irish, the rest Chinese. They were a great army laying siege to nature in her strongest citadel. The rugged mountains looked like stupendous ant-hills. They swarmed with celestials, shoveling, wheeling, carting, drilling and blasting rocks and earth, while their dull, mooney eyes stared out from under those immense basket-hats, like umbrellas. At several dining camps we

eating soft boiled rice with chopsticks as fast as terrestrials could with soup ladles. ... Cape Horn is a huge mountain around whose side track winds upon a little shelf seven hundred feet above valley and streambed."

(* Colfax is 54 miles east of Sacramento)
