Collecting and Trading Historical Token Coins from the Colfax Area

March 30, 2019 Meeting and Program

Rodger Hisken will display and explain the history of metal and wooden tokens that were issued in the Colfax area

Our next guest speaker will be **Rodger Hisken,** who will display, explain, and answer questions about his collection of metal and wooden trade tokens (also known as token coins) that were issued and used in the Colfax area. Sometimes called "merchant tokens," they were used to encourage repeat business by giving a customer a token that could only be redeemed with the merchant or business.

Rodger will explain the history of tokens, illustrating his presentation with tokens from his personal collection and stories about the detective work involved in collecting and identifying them. Rodger will also answer questions.

Rodger will have tokens from his

And some history about tokens

A business in Colfax might have had only 100 tokens created. The tokens would be given to customers, and when they were redeemed, the business would give them out again to other customers. Total circulation would never surpass the 100 tokens that were created.

Tokens are coins but they are not legal tender coins, meaning they are not issued by a government authority and cannot be freely exchanged for goods other than those provided by the merchant or business that issued the token.

They are more varied in their shapes, sizes, images, wording, and overall design than government-issued coins.

Tokens usually display the name of the merchant or business that issued it and either the value of the token or information about its redemption value.

They are usually made either of cheaper metals than government-issued coins or of nonmetal materials such as plastic.

During World War II, the Office of Price Administration (OPA) issued small vulcanized fiber tokens that were used to make change when people used their ration coupons. Vulcanized fiber is a plastic made from cellulose.

Two billion of the OPA tokens were issued. After the war, many of them were destroyed, but some are still available as collectibles.

Some tokens are issued by groups that use them to commemorate or recognize accomplishments, such as Alcoholics Anonymous.

According to *Collectors Weekly*, "beginning in the mid-19th century, fraternal orders such as the Masons, Odd Fellows, Eagles, and Elks issued tokens that could be presented as proof of membership in the order (these are known as 'mark pennies'), as souvenirs, and for gambling." Tokens are also issued as souvenirs of locations and events.

Subway systems and game arcades still use tokens on a large scale. For the businesses, they provide several advantages: tokens can only be spent in the arcade or subway, theft is reduced because tokens aren't as attractive as quarters or currency, tokens can be given to customers without giving them something they could spend elsewhere, and tokens are less likely to jam coin slots than coins are.

When You Join, How is the Money Used?

Membership dues and all money raised help us accomplish the following goals:

- Maintain the Colfax Heritage Museum in the Colfax Passenger Depot building, in Colfax.
- Maintain historical archives in a rented room at the Sierra Vista Community Center.
- Manage a growing collection of archival artifacts and make these available for research.
- Preserve and protect a collection of 10,000 glass negatives taken by Grace Hubley Jones, a successful commercial photographer of this area.
- Collect and catalog photographs of early Colfax families since the 1850s.
- Research and compile the history of early buildings in Colfax, with commemorative bronze plaques placed on buildings along Main Street.
- Recognize and register three historical areas (Colfax Passenger Depot, Freight Depot, and the Cape Horn Overlook) as Historical Landmarks with the California State Preservation Commission.
- Research the history of various personalities in Colfax, such as Robert Fowler (aviator) and Pat Jones (journalist), and dedicate monuments to them.

- Develop a file system to assist persons searching for information on people and history of Colfax and the surrounding area; start a collection of oral family histories on tape.
- Display archival and historical materials at public events.
- Publish and sell historical publications related to Colfax and other nearby communities.

Museum and Archives

The Colfax Area Historical Society (CAHS) and the Colfax Heritage Museum (CHM) preserve the local history of Colfax, California, the surrounding area, and the railroads, by collecting stories, photographs, and artifacts about the people and buildings in this part of the Sierra foothills.

The CAHS and CHM have an Archives Room that is currently open to the public by appointment. The Museum and the Archives collections include **physical items**, such as Chinese ceramics and baskets, period clothing from 1800 to 1940, and local WWII memorabilia, **historical books and other literature**, **maps and pictures** of the Colfax area and of many of the railroads, and **the Grace Hubley Jones Photographic Collection**.
